- 18. Children need more recess to avoid obesity and all of the health problems that are a part of that challenge. Children in early childhood ages of 3 to 10 need exercise to get out the wiggles and prepare for more mental learning. Outdoor play, nature walks, and dancing are some ways to get children active.
- 19. Guidelines include remaining calm, believing the child, listening without passing judgment, assuring the child it isn't their fault, make certain the child is safe, and report your suspicions to your principal or program administrator or the child and family services agency.
- 20. Answers can include:
 - Create a safe and trusting classroom environment.
 - Attune yourself to the vast array of needs that children of poverty bring to your classroom.
 - Develop home libraries so children and families have access to books and other literacy materials.
 - Advocate for high-quality, universal (available for all children), full-day preschool paid for by tax dollars.
 - Be attuned to the social class differences that children bring to the classroom.
 - Educate parents and family members about positive child-rearing and behavioral guidance practices.
 - Be active in identifying children who are struggling and develop ways to help them
 - Encourage parents to send their children to school.
 - Provide children with social experiences across all social classes.
 - Know and practice developmentally appropriate practice (DAP).
